Those who attended the Webster's Crossing United Methodist Church on 9/2/18 found Jim Yarger providing the leadership for the Sunday Service while our Pastor Dorothy Hotchkiss was filling her duties at the Balloon Festival in Dansville. We were blessed to have food for thought based on Romans 1 and the description Jim (knowledgeable about home construction) gave reminding us of having God as our cornerstone in all we do.

Pat Granger from the Springwater United Methodist Church writes: "We prayed for the safety of the students, teachers, and all school staff. Our "Hand Up" mission put together 9 book bags with supplies. We are on Chapter 25 of "The Story". People thought that Jesus was John the Baptist, Elijah, or a prophet. Peter, one of the disciples, was asked by Jesus, "Who do you say that I am?" Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the son of God." Jesus told his disciples that he was going to be rejected by religious leaders, the teachers of the law. He would be killed and after three days, rise again, but this was difficult for his disciples to comprehend. Jesus went to Jerusalem to celebrate the Festival of Tabernacles where he revealed his authority, identity, and mission. While there he received word his friend Lazarus was dying. Jesus and his disciples traveled to Judea where Lazarus lived. When they arrived Lazarus had been in the tomb for four days. Jesus requested the tomb be opened. He called Lazarus to come out. Lazarus did walk out. During the time Jesus was gone to Judea the religious leaders started plotting to kill him. My trip to the Springwater Farmers Market on Friday, August 31, was blessed with two bunches of zinnias for the church flowers on Sunday, four ears of corn, two zucchini, and one vellow squash. This supplemented an already full refrigerator and freezer provided by a field trip to Bejo Seeds in Geneva, NY. My long time friend and Cornell Cooperative Extension co-worker in Home Food Preservation, Judy Price, invited me to attend the Bejo Open House (a two day yearly affair August 28 and 29). We were treated to a great visit with Karen Miltner of Democrat & Chronicle Food Columnist fame (who also wrote an outstanding piece for the D&C about our All Western Evergreen Nursery & Christmas Tree Farm several years ago), and her husband Dennis Ferlito who are the owners of the Bejo business on the corner of Preemption Road and Healey Road. Dennis took us around the vegetable plantations on their Kubota Utility vehicle, stopping to treat us to tastes of red Beets and white Beets, pink Tomatoes, yellow Peppers, beautiful tasty Radishes, green Kohlrabi, crisp Chinese cabbage, purple Radicchio, pointed green Cabbage, stem Broccoli, and Bok Choy. Needless to say, we were astounded at their bounty and generosity.

On Sunday, September 2, eight Springwater Trail's hikers enjoyed the hike planned by Rick at Stony Brook State Park. The weather was balmy, and many people were enjoying the park activities. The views of the many different waterfalls were spectacular. The water was flowing over the shale rocks and under the bridges; the shear walls, many cleared by avalanches, showed the rock stratification, had wild flowers blooming, mushrooms growing, or were moss covered, and the path was wet in many areas. Everyone stayed for the social with excellent food provided by all. Our next hike will be at 2 PM (our time change for hikes in fall) at Hi Tor near Naples.
