It may be a snowy or rainy night and not having to cook or do clean-up after is enticing for those hard working people on their way home from work. The goal is to nourish people in the area. Pastor Dorothy provides an outstanding sermon at 9 a.m. every Sunday morning, so come enjoy the time at church. Face masks are recommended and the pews are marked to make it easy to attend. Last Sunday, October 25, the sermon was on the background of the hymn "What a Friend we have in Jesus" given by lay leader, Joice Kelly-Biek. You are invited to come and learn about the stories in the Bible that will make your week better.

This past week the All Western Evergreen Nursery & Christmas Tree Farm was "rented" for a day by a Boy Scout troop from Rochester. The "rent" was a donation toward Trees for Troops. The Scouts had a 5 mile hike on the farm, picked up red pine cones for the farm to dry and use on wreaths, and enjoyed a picnic lunch they brought, removed invasive plants like honeysuckle and multi-flora-rose bushes from the front yard at the farm entrance using saws and loppers, and built a campfire for the evening meal. The farm owners gave a bit of farm history; set up a tree bough exhibit with many of the species on the farm showcased as a game to share

conifers that are evergreens (pines, firs, and spruces), evergreens that are not conifers (holly and boxwood), conifers that are not evergreens (larch), cedars (Alaska yellow cedar, Western redcedar, and Eastern white cedar), Russian micro-biota and juniper; and showed a cone exhibit from western trees like sugar pine and Coulter pine, and cones from red, Austrian, Scots, eastern white pines, southwestern white pines; Norway, Black Hills, white spruce and hemlock; and Douglas-fir (a false fir because its cones grow downwards, have bracts and do not shatter, while true firs have cones that grow upwards and shatter leaving an unsightly stick about an inch to 2 inches long, mostly on the upper branches).

This time seems to be a turning point in my activities now that the farmers markets and the food preservation classes are done for the season.
