Pat Granger from the Springwater United Methodist Church writes: "It did cool down a little this week and I have not been a very happy camper because of it. I just have to keep reminding myself that it is only June. This week I certainly didn't have to worry about watering the flowers at the cemetery so they will last longer. Well on with our bible study for this week. The chapter was entitled "The King Who Had It All". David reigned for over 40 years. His youngest son Solomon would be the next King. David told God that he wanted to build a temple for him and God told him not to, but to have his son Solomon do it. God felt that in David's lifetime he had been through enough. So David started acquiring the materials that would be needed to build this temple. Before David died he told Solomon, to be strong, faithful to God, protect the temple and everything that would be in it, and to obey God's laws. Solomon was also to have his descendants do the same. If he did this he would prosper, God would look after him. Solomon did not get the temple finished before David died. The construction of the temple took over seven years of work by 180,000 workers and 4,000 supervisors. When it was completed King Solomon dedicated the temple to God. God also told Solomon that if he remained faithful to him, as his father David had, he would see that there was a successor to the throne; however, if he did not remain faithful, God would uproot Israel from the land and destroy the

temple. During Solomon's life, a man with many wives was considered okay, but not in God's eyes. What did Solomon do but have many wives and he loved each one. The wives convinced him to be unfaithful to his God and be faithful to theirs. God was not pleased with this. God told Solomon He would not do it while he was alive but when Solomon died He would take part of the kingdom away from Solomon's son, who would be the next King. Here is another instance where someone did not remain faithful to God and there were consequences. Be faithful to God and he will be there for you.
