




School #22 Webster's Crossing NY - Class of 1938 Route 15 in Webster's Crossing NY.




School #22 Webster's Crossing NY - Class of 1934 - Route 15 in Webster's Crossing NY.





POTATO STORAGE:

The potato storage was built by Harvey Humphrey in 1875, next to railroad so farmers could ship hay, fruits, etc. (it housed the first Post Office). In 1968, the building was purchased by Gail & Ray Wagner they made the building into four apartments. It later was bought by a family by the name of Preston and made into a family home.

POST OFFICE:

The Post Office had several homes. The first Post Master was Elisha Webster, the first home was the Humphrey Potato Cellar. William Johnson's Furniture was the second place, The Hardware Store, then it was housed in Merton May's home . In 1956 it was moved to the Case home in the middle of the Hamlet (where Gladys Weed lives). Gladys was Postmaster at this time. The Post Office closed on February 1, 1998 and consolidated with Springwater Post Office.

Era ends at Webster Crossing Post office to close for good on Fri.

Call it the little post office that couldn't.

The Webster Crossing Post Office in the town of Springwater will close its doors tomorrow, Feb. 13—the latest casualty in a nationwide effort by the US Postal Service to streamline its operations.

Although residents expressed dismay at losing the 104-year-old facility, USPS review official Ken Thompson said the decision was not arrived at lightly.

"What usually happens in these cases is whenever we have, for instance, a postmaster vacancy or similar situation, it provides us with an opportunity to take a look at how we do business in that community," Thompson said. This is especially true, he said, where the Postal Service leases the facility from a third party.

The Webster Crossing Post Office has for the past 35 years leased its quarters in the home of the former postmaster, Gladys Weed.

Although the Postal Service often comes under fire, frequently being

charged with taking too close a look at its bottom line and being insensitive to community needs in areas where the post office may be less than profitable, Thompson says that's not the case, at least in Webster Crossing.

"The Postal Service doesn't want to intentionally cause pain and sorrow," Thompson said, "so we're willing to work with people."

The post office currently rents 58 of its 96 boxes, and those boxholders will be the ones most affected by the change

"What we'll do is provide service to those customers via rural delivery," Thompson said, "and they'll be allowed to keep 'Webster Crossing' in the address. The only difference will be that the ZIP code will change from 14584 to 14560 (Springwater)."

A few boxholders, however, reside in Conesus, and will have to change to a Conesus address and ZIP code, Thompson added, "but 90 percent go to Springwater."

Thompson acknowledged that the Postal Service is not set up to be a money-making venture.

Under the terms of its charter, "it

shall provide prompt, reliable and efficient services to patrons in all areas and shall render postal services to all communities."

"We feel that by still allowing customers to keep Webster Crossing as their address, we're helping the community to preserve its identity," Thompson said, adding, however, that economic issues had to be addressed in order that the Postal Service could stay responsible to all its customers.

Sandy West, officer in charge at Webster Crossing for the past five years, will move on to a position at the Perkinsville post office.

To mark the bittersweet occasion, a special commemorative has been planned for Friday afternoon, sponsored by the Springwater-Websters Crossing Historical Society.

From 3 to 5 p.m., patrons may have a cancellation mark placed on a copy of a poem written for the event by Havilah Toland. The poem reads, in part: "This day the flag is lowered in finality;/ The end of an era leaves a void./ The last postmark, the official farewell—/The eternal reminder of fond memories."
